This handbook covers academic information, administrative procedures, the code of conduct for students, and basic regulations that you are advised to familiarize yourself with as a student of the Department of Spanish and Latin American Studies.

2. College of Humanities and International Studies

1) Overview

The College of Humanities and International Studies aims at developing a vision for the future by providing a learning environment in which students can study their majors in the context of both the past and the present. Students are empowered to investigate diverse fields of knowledge (domestic and foreign cultures, history, international and area studies and so on) and learn how to understand these different fields within authentic frames of reference, while at the same time acquiring their own personal ideas and insights.

3. Department of Spanish and Latin American Studies

1) Introduction

The Spanish and Latin American Studies Major was established in 2007 as one of 14 majors in Korea that offer Spanish language education.

Unlike other Spanish language departments/majors, the curriculum of the Latin American Studies Major at Keimyung University focuses specifically on Latin American Studies and aims to educate students as area specialists with in-depth knowledge of the region and fluency in Spanish.

The Spanish and Latin American Studies Major addresses both local and national demands for Latin American specialists and expands the scope of the academic community at Keimyung University by adding one of the most studied regions to the Faculty of Area and International Studies' area studies program.

2) Academic Objectives

- I. To provide students with practical knowledge of Latin America, preparing them to become specialists in the field.
- II. To cultivate proficiency in practical Spanish, enabling students to communicate effectively in a variety of settings.
- III. To encourage a well-rounded understanding of Latin America, encompassing cultural, historical, political, and economic perspectives.

3) Paths after Graduation

Graduates of the Department of Spanish and Latin American Studies have access to a wide range of opportunities. With growing demand from companies seeking to expand their business and markets in Latin America, graduates with a major in Latin American Studies can find job opportunities in international business and trade both in Korea and in Latin America. Those who participate in language programs or study abroad in Latin America can also find positions at translation and interpretation agencies. Additionally, due to a shortage of Latin American specialists in Korea, there are opportunities for those who show potential for pursuing academic careers in higher education or research institutions. Moreover, many graduates are active in the domestic and international tourism industry, working for companies such as Korean Airline, Asiana Airline, and various hotel chains.

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4. University Affairs Guide

- College courses are divided into required courses and elective courses. By subject, they are categorized into liberal arts courses (common liberal arts, balanced liberal arts, general liberal arts), major courses (required major courses, elective major courses, major recognition courses), and teaching courses (some departments do not have required major courses).

A. Credit

1) Credit is a unit which gives weight to the time requirement of an academic course. 2) Credits are determined by subject, and if a certain grade is not achieved for each subject, the student will be disqualified, and the disqualified subject will not be recognized as credits earned.

3) Graduation credits and credits allowed for completion

a) Graduation Credits by Year of Admission

(1) Students entering in 2024 and beyond: 120 credits

(2) Students entering up to and including 2023: 130 credits

b) Permitted Credits by Year of Admission

(1) Students entering in 2024 and beyond: No more than 18 credits per semester or 34 credits per academic year

(2) Students entering up to and including 2023: No more than 20 credits per semester or 36 credits per academic year

B. Liberal arts curriculum

1) Students who entered the school in **2014~2018**

: Completed at least one <Special Topics In Latin American Studies> or Spanish native language course (foreign professor) or obtained at least 600 FLEX points, DELE B2 grade, and at least 459 SIELE points (but 300 points if only two areas are acquired)

2) Students who entered the school in **2019~**

: Completed at least one Spanish native language course (foreign professor) for the 3rd and 4th graders, or obtaining FLEX 600 or higher (but 400 points more if only two areas are acquired), DELE B1 or higher, and SIELE 459 or higher (but 300 points more if only two areas are acquired)

11) International Exchange Program

- ▶ College of International Studies – International Exchange Program

1. Semester Abroad Program

A. Summary: This program is for students from departments in the Division of Foreign Language and Literature, and the Division of International Area Studies, to study at an affiliated foreign university with an approved curriculum for the duration of one standard semester (16 weeks). The program provides an immersive learning experience in the language, society, and culture of the host country.

B. Study term: Third year first semester or second semester.

C. Selection and Departure: March or September recruitment dependent on study term.

D. Participant Target and Selection Criteria:

1) 4-5 students per approved semester, chosen from affiliated majors (including students on leave of absence) (part-time, transfer, or students who have studied abroad in the past two years need special approval to participate. Students who intend to graduate during the semester abroad cannot participate).

2) Students who have unapproved majors, multiple-majors, or undeclared majors cannot participate.

3) Selection is based on the student's language ability for the chosen country.

4) Selection criteria also varies for each academic department.

E. Approved Academic Credits: **15-18 credits** within major.

F. Host University: United States, China, Japan, United Kingdom, Columbia, Mexico and all other universities affiliated with Keimyung University.

G. Tuition and Fees:

1) Tuition varies based on agreements made with each foreign university. Keimyung University provides up to 70% of the tuition as a scholarship.

2) While studying aboard the student may have to pay for various other expenses which include: additional course fees (when applicable), transportation, housing, and living costs.

2. Foreign Language Study Program (SAP)

A. Summary: To increase language fluency and to cultivate international sensibilities through cultural immersion, this language study program takes place at Keimyung's sister universities during the summer and winter terms breaks.

B. Selection and Departure: March-April or September-October recruitment for corresponding term break study.

C. Application Requirements:

1) Average G.P.A. (including failures) 3.00 or above.

2) Selection is based on the student's language ability for the chosen country. Selection criteria also varies for each academic department.

D. Approved Academic Credits: Summer/Winter term (major or distribution requirements) **3 credits**.

E. Host University: United States, China, Japan, United Kingdom, Columbia, Mexico and all other universities affiliated with Keimyung University.

F. Scholarship and Financial Aid: 500,000 won or 1,000,000 won. 20,000 won travel insurance fee provided.

2) Career Program

▶ After graduation, we systematically operate a variety of programs for successful employment that our students want, and also consult relevant departments and academic advisor on issues such as employment, business start-ups, and career path.

3) Confirmation of Employment and Acknowledgement of Attendance for Early Employment

▶ Eligibility: A student who gets a job during the graduating semester

▶ Acknowledgement of Attendance: Applicable to the lectures equivalent to the period of employment

A) The total period of employment confirmed as early employment during the graduating semester

B) Including the period of employment by transfer

▶ Process of Employment and Acknowledgement of Attendance for Early Employment

A) Step 1: Confirmation of employment

(1) Application for confirmation of early employment

(within 2 weeks from the date of employment)

(2) Confirmation of early employment

(by the Employment Support Team)

(3) Printing out the certificate of early employment

(within 1 week from confirmation)

(4) Submit the certificate of early employment to and consult the professor who teaches the subject

(within 2 weeks from the date of employment).

B) Step 2: Acknowledgement of Attendance

(1) Application for acknowledgement of attendance : Edward System. A personal application.

(2) Acknowledgement of attendance :

Acknowledged by the Employment Support Team from time to time after the application.

(3) Submission of attendance certificates :

Submit it to the Professor in charge of the subject prior to the end of the regular exam.

※ Submit the acknowledgement of attendance for early employment to the professor who teaches the subject (prior to the closing date of regular test).

- ▶ Supporting Document by Type of Employment: The Employment Support Team will verify supporting document for confirmation of employment and acknowledgement of attendance, and the student will print out the relevant certificate and submit it to the professor who teaches the subject.

4) Volunteering Scholarship

- ▶ How To Apply for Volunteering Scholarship

EDWARD Portal → System → Academic Administration → Scholarship → Apply for Scholarship → Apply for Volunteering Scholarship → Print out the application for scholarship after filling up → Submit to the administration office

- ▶ What is volunteering scholarship? It is a system that gives a tuition waiver to students who volunteer at the department office for 50 hours. These students are called 'Volunteering Scholars'.
- ▶ Period of Application: To be notified on Kakao Talk chat room by year

- ▶ Eligibility: A student belonging to within the 8th income class as a result of examination for provision of national scholarship
- ▶ A student has not applied for national scholarship will be excluded from the eligibility for volunteering scholarship.
- ▶ It gives a tuition waiver when the payment of tuition is made, and there is no notice regarding the scholarship. (necessary to report the name of volunteering scholarship and amount of scholarship on the tuition bill.
- ▶ Students selected as a volunteering scholar will have voluntary activities at the department office.
* In the event of non-fulfillment of 50-hour voluntary activity, the violating student will be excluded from the application for volunteering scholarship for the following semester, and the student must return the amount of scholarship.

In the event of any emergency situation, announce quickly and clearly through contact system by year.

(Department Office / President of Society → Representative by year → All students)

10) Disaster Evacuation Training

▶ Earthquake

* The campus buildings are built from concrete without earthquake resistant design.

① When you sense an earthquake, open the closest door wide.

- There is a possibility that you cannot evacuate as the door may not be opened due to the twisted status of the building.
- The person who first opened the door should shout fire and keep others informed about a fire escape

② Protect your head with a book, laptop or other article which can protect your head.

- Underground facility is relatively safer than on-ground facility, but you should keep waiting at your place until the shaking stops.
- As delay of evaluation to underground facility may occur due to a massive number of people flocked. Therefore, start evacuation from letting people near the exit out under the direction of the leader.
- If you are staying on third or fourth floor which is relatively upper floor of the building, get under the desk or the table when the earthquake occurs as it is likely to evacuate depending on the condition of damages on the building

(Evacuate immediately when the strength of earthquakes is lowered.)

③ Evacuate quickly through where a door is opened

- Run crouching down and covering your head
- Evacuate avoiding windows

(Do not evacuate through windows as those on the first floor tend to be seriously damaged during earthquake.)

④ After evacuation, move to a wide empty lot
- Wait for rescue standing up for preventing damages from additional minor shakes (It is dangerous to squat or lie on the ground after evacuation.)

▶ How to evacuate building on fire

- Activate a fire alarm.
- If you cannot go downstairs, go onto the rooftop.
- Make your face and body covered with wet blanket or towel when you should ran into flames.
- If door handles are too hot to turn, do not open the door and find another way.
- Once you evacuate, do not go into the building again.
- After evacuation, wait for rescue at the windward side.

* How to deal with fire following earthquake

1. Shout 'Fire!' immediately after feeling minor quakes before the next big quake to alarm around and turn off the heat.
2. Shout 'Fire!' when big quake stops. Put out the fire
3. The big aftermath is exhausted within one to two minutes, so you can put out in its early stages. Keep fire extinguisher or big fire-extinguishing bowl at any possible spot of fire for immediate action.
